I'm sending you this letter regarding the environmental survey ordered by FERC for the presence of snuffbox mussels. There is insufficient evidence regarding these mussels to warrant the survey.

The impact on the community is devastating. The dam repairs should be made as soon as possible and the survey greatly holds up repairs. There is an extensive economic lost to the county, city, township, and property owners on Secord Lake. Several people on Secord Lake have had their wells go dry, wood seawalls are drying out, erosion has taken a great toll on our shorelines. The cost to the people on our lake should take priority over snuffbox mussels.

We are nearing 80 years old and must sell. Now that the property values have gone down, banks will not finance these homes, businesses are closing, etc. We are dependent on the money from our house/property sale to help with our retirement. The current situation does not allow us to sell.

We are requesting that you not put the priority of the FERC survey for the possibility of snuffbox mussels in Secord Lake over the economic hardships that we are experiencing. This survey is just one more thing that is holding up the repair of the dam.

Before the dam failures at Edenville and Sanford the Four Lakes Task Force was going to take over Secord, Smallwood, Edenville and Sanford Dams. They had a plan which would cost all taxpayers \$5 million to repair all of these dams and leave them as hydro dams. This plan was reasonable and accepted by taxpayers and so they were allowed to become a special assessment district. On May 19th Edenville and Sanford dams failed. Secord and Smallwood did not. Now FLTF wants taxpayers to spend \$400 million dollars to replace the two failed dams along with the two dams that did not fail.Im sure you can agree this is not acceptable as this plan will lcost \$12,000 per home on Secord alone. The effects of the loss of Secord lake on the local economy and property values of over 1,800 lake homes has been severe. New buyers are unable to acquire mortgages, the fire department in many areas has no access to water for fighting fires, our wells are going dry, seawalls and shorelines are eroding and local businesses are suffering and shuttering their doors.

In the wake of all of this we are once again facing the issue of alleged snuffbox mussel habitat for which there is no proof. There is no current evidence of the snuffbox mussel being in Secord Lake or associated tributaries that supports the requested study. Indeed if the snuffbox mussel does inhabit the area it is suffering due to slow moving murky water inherent with all of the erosion and associated run off.

According to the Michigan State University" Natural Features

Inventory"<u>https://mnfi.anr.msu.edu/species/description/12365/Epioblasma-triquetra</u> there have not been any observed snuffbox mussel in Gladwin County. The requested studies are baseless and are hindering the efforts to restore the environment in and around Secord Lake. The requested study is taking time and resources away from the repair of the dam and restoration of the lake.

It concerns us greatly that the alleged presence of this mussel takes precedence over the interests of property values, safety, and our local livelihood. The presence of snuffbox mussel's critical habitat here on Secord Lake has never been established therefore we should not have to incur additional hardship as property owners for the time and use of resources that it will take to disprove the mussels existence.

We are requesting your assistance in putting an end to this frivolous request for studies that will cost our community much needed time and money.

Dear sirs,

I am a 72 year old retired, 4 year resident at Secord Lake.

Along with my wife, we used our retirement savings to purchase this lakefront home where we had planned to live out our "Golden" years.

However, with no water in the lake, our living situation has changed dramatically.

Without being able to draw water from the lake to irrigate our lawn, we were forced to use a hose and our house water well to try and keep our once beautiful nearly half acre lawn alive.

However, we are now starting to notice an increase in the sulfur smell of the water and have been advised to cease watering the lawn, as several residents in our neighborhood have had their wells run dry, and have had to have new ones drilled at considerable expense.

Also, our seawall is beginning to shift, and I've had to back fill it in several spots already. If it collapses, as will likely happen if the water level is not returned to normal SOON, I am told to expect a cost of no less than \$2000 at a minimum to have it restored, not counting the cost to remove the debris from the lakebed as I would be required to do.

I understand that there is some concern about the possibility of the Snuffbox Mussel existing somewhere within the flow of the Tittabawasee River which forms the several lakes in the area, courtesy of the dams. If a detailed study of this matter must be performed, I would request that it take place AFTER the lake level at Secord has been restored to normal.

Besides the decrease in our personal quality of life, many of the local area businesses are suffering from the dramatic decrease in revenue due to part time residents either greatly reducing the amount of time (and money!) they spend in the area with no lake to enjoy, or simply not coming up at all.

Many of these businesses have been hanging on by a thread for years since the economic crash in Michigan in the early 1980's. Some have already shuttered their places for good. If you are feeling in an excessively good mood one day, I would suggest a sightseeing ride through these small towns. Look at the number of vacant business places. Then go out on nearly any nearby road and look at the abandoned homes, and shacks littered with disabled cars and trash where people STILL live. This should give you an idea of how things are going even WITHOUT the loss of the lake!

I read in one piece of correspondence between the various parties that economic concerns cannot be considered when viewing the mussel issue. I would submit that if for none other than purely selfish reasons, with the decrease in property values as well as the sparse population of the formerly thriving summer lake communities and the subsequent decrease in business revenue, someone sitting in an office funded by the taxes taken from these affected areas should realize that this situation cannot go on for long before those same government agencies, both state and federal will begin to look at ways to decrease their operating expenses, perhaps by downsizing the agency itself. One agency, (Four Lakes Task Force), supposedly representing the interests of the Secord residents as well as others downstream received a government handout of \$5 million, most of which they have managed to spend without a penny going to the small amount of needed repairs to the Secord dam. Needless to say, what confidence I may have initially had in this agency has been seriously depleted. A new agency (Secord Lake Preservation Association) is attempting to take up our cause where the FLTF failed.

So, for the benefit of ALL involved (save only perhaps the lawyers pursuing all of the various suits), I would beg you to move on our behalf. Allow the necessary repairs to be made to the Secord dam, and the lake restored. Don't force all of us who stand to lose so much to experience even greater harm for want of a lengthy study of a mussel which may not actually live here or be in harm's way at all.
